- **Automatic transmission fluid & filter:** Replace every 24,000 miles (38,000 km) under severe conditions, or 48,000 miles (77,000 km) normal. Use Mopar ATF+4.
- **Transfer case fluid:** Change every 24,000 miles for Command-Trac/Selec-Trac. Use Mopar ATF+4.
- **Brake fluid:** Inspect every 12,000 miles, replace if moisture content is high or every 2 years.
- **Air filter:** Replace every 30,000 miles (more often in dusty environments).

These intervals are explicitly listed in the **Jeep Cherokee Sport Owners Manual 2001**. If you have lost your manual, these figures are critical for maintaining your vehicle’s reliability.

FLUID SPECIFICATIONS: WHAT THE MANUAL RECOMMENDS

- **Transfer Case:** Mopar ATF+4. Capacity is about 1.4 quarts.
- **Differentials (Front and Rear):** 80W-90 GL-5 gear oil. The front diff holds about 1.3 quarts, the rear Dana 35 or 44 holds 1.7 quarts.
- **Brake Fluid:** DOT 3 or DOT 4 (the manual specifies DOT 3, but DOT 4 is backward-compatible).
- **Power Steering:** Mopar Power Steering Fluid or any ATF+4 (yes, ATF+4 works for power steering on the XJ).
