For each word, write a short, humorous definition or sentence that fits the character speaking it. For example, the "Jester"

character might use a silly sentence, while the "Overachiever" might correct the moderator.

Step 3: Weave in Conflict and Resolution

No good script is without conflict. Perhaps two contestants are old rivals, or a character is struggling with the pressure to win from their parents. The resolution should align with Christmas values: forgiveness, kindness, and the understanding

that the real prize is friendship and community. The final scene often features all contestants joining together to spell a final, impossible word as a group, or abandoning the competition to sing a carol together.

Step 4: Add Musical or Comic Interlude s

To keep the energy high, insert short musical breaks or comic sketches between rounds. A character could

perform a short dance every time they spell a word correctly, or the moderator could tell a corny Christmas joke. These interludes break up the tension and give the cast moments to shine outside of spelling.
