WHAT YOU WILL NEED

- **One full sheet of newspaper.** A standard broadsheet page works best, but you can also use a tabloid sheet or even a large piece of wrapping paper. The key is that the paper is thin enough to fold easily but sturdy enough to hold its shape.
- **A flat, clean surface.** A table, desk, or even the floor will do. You want enough space to spread the paper out fully.
- **Optional: markers, stickers, feathers, or craft supplies.** These are for decorating your finished hat, but they are not essential for the folding process.

That is it. No rulers, no glue, no tape. Just your hands and a bit of patience. If you have ever folded a paper airplane or a simple origami crane, you already have the foundational skills needed for this project.

STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS: HOW TO FOLD A PIRATE HAT OUT OF NEWSPAPER

Follow these steps carefully, and you will have a recognizable pirate hat in just a few minutes. Take your time with each fold to ensure crisp edges and a symmetrical result.

Step 1: Prepare the Paper

Lay your sheet of newspaper flat on your work surface. Orient it so that the longer edges are at the top and bottom, and the shorter edges are on the sides. If your newspaper has multiple sections, you may want to use a single sheet from the center of the paper, as it tends to be flatter and less wrinkled.

Step 2: Fold the Paper in Half Horizontally

Bring the top edge of the paper down to meet the bottom edge. Crease the fold firmly with your fingers, running from one side to the other. You should now have a long, narrow rectangle. The open edge (where the two halves meet) should be at the bottom, and the folded edge should be at the top.

Step 3: Fold the Top Corners to the Center

Keeping the folded edge at the top, take the top-left corner and fold it diagonally downward so that it meets the center of the paper. Do the same with the top-right corner. You should now have a shape that resembles a house with a pointed roof. The two folded triangles should meet at the center, leaving a small rectangular flap at the bottom.

Step 4: Fold the Bottom

Flaps Up

This step is critical. At the bottom of your paper, you will see a rectangular strip that is not yet folded. Take the top layer of this strip and fold it upward, over the bottom edges of the two triangles you just created. Crease well. Then, flip the entire piece over and repeat the process on the other side. You now have a basic paper hat shape, but it is not quite finished.

Step 5: Open the Hat and Shape the Brim

Place your fingers inside the open bottom of the hat and gently pull the sides apart. The hat will begin to take on a three-dimensional shape. As you open it, press down lightly on the top point to define the crown. The brim should naturally flare out to the sides. Adjust the folds as needed to make the hat symmetrical.

Step 6: Optional – Add a Pirate Flair

Now that your hat is formed, you can personalize it. Many classic newspaper pirate hats feature a skull and crossbones drawn on the front, a feather tucked into the brim, or even a strip of red

fabric tied around the base. Let your creativity sail free.

TIPS FOR A PERFECT PIRATE HAT EVERY TIME

Even a simple fold can benefit from a bit of know-how. Here are some expert tips to help you achieve the best possible result when you learn **how to fold a pirate hat out of newspaper**:

- **Use a crisp sheet.** Wrinkled or crumpled newspaper will produce a floppy hat that does not hold its shape well. If your newspaper is creased, iron it on a low setting or press it under heavy books for a few minutes.
- **Crease firmly.** Run your fingernail or a bone folder along each fold to create sharp, defined edges. Sharp creases help the hat maintain its structure.
- **Mind the size.** A standard broadsheet page makes a hat that fits most adults and older children. For younger children, you can trim the paper slightly before folding, or simply fold a smaller sheet.
- **Symmetry matters.** When folding the top corners to the center, try to make the two triangles as even as possible. An asymmetrical hat will still look like a pirate hat, but it will be lopsided.
- **Practice makes perfect.** If your first attempt does not look quite right, try again. The folding process is easy to repeat, and each attempt will improve your technique.

CREATIVE VARIATIONS ON THE CLASSIC FOLD

Once you have mastered the basic technique, you might find yourself wanting to experiment. The newspaper pirate hat is a

surprisingly versatile template, and small changes can yield entirely new looks.

The Tricorn Hat

To create a tricorn-style hat, which features a brim turned up on three sides, start with the basic pirate hat but do not open it fully. Instead, fold the front brim up slightly and the back brim down, then pinch the sides to create a triangular silhouette. This style is particularly associated with 18th-century naval officers and looks impressive with a bit of gold trim drawn on.

The Bicorn Hat

The bicorn hat is the classic Napoleonic style, with the brim turned up on two sides. To achieve this, fold the basic hat and then bring the front and back brims upward, creating a crescent-like shape. This variation is a favorite for costume parties where you want to evoke a more military or historical pirate look.

The Captain's Hat

For a taller, more commanding crown, start with a larger sheet of paper or fold the initial horizontal fold slightly offset so that more paper is available for the crown. You can also stuff the inside of the hat with a bit of crumpled newspaper to give it a more three-dimensional, structured appearance.

DECORATING YOUR NEWSPAPER PIRATE HAT

A plain newspaper hat is recognizable, but a decorated one is unforgettable. Here are some ideas to turn your folded creation into a true masterpiece:

- **Draw a skull and crossbones.** Use a black marker or pen to sketch a classic Jolly Roger on the front of the hat. Keep it simple: a white or empty circle for the skull, two crossed lines for the bones.
- **Add a feather.** Tuck a real or craft feather into the brim on the left side. Red, blue, or green feathers add a pop of color against the newsprint.
- **Wrap with ribbon.** A strip of red, black, or gold ribbon tied around the base of the crown gives the hat a finished, costume-quality look.
- **Use stickers or stamps.** For a quick and mess-free decoration, use star stickers, anchor stamps, or other nautical motifs.
- **Color the newsprint.** While newspaper is typically black and white, you can use colored pencils or markers to add stripes, patterns, or even a sunset scene to the hat.

BEYOND THE HAT: ACTIVITIES AND PLAY IDEAS

TROUBLESHOOTING COMMON FOLDING ISSUES
