Central banks watch inflation closely because they are tasked with keeping it stable. High inflation may prompt a central bank to raise rates, which can attract capital inflows and support the currency.

Interest Rates and Central Bank Policy

Interest rates are arguably the most powerful factor in currency valuation. When a country raises interest rates, its currency often

appreciates because higher rates attract foreign capital seeking better returns. Forex fundamental analysis pays close attention to central bank decisions, meeting minutes, and forward guidance from policymakers.

Retail Sales and Consumer Confidence

Retail sales data reflects consumer spending, which drives a large portion of economic activity in developed nations. Consumer confidence surveys indicate how optimistic people feel about the economy. Rising confidence tends to support spending and economic growth, which can be positive for the currency.

Trade Balance

The trade balance measures exports minus imports. A trade surplus (more exports than imports) generally supports a currency because foreign buyers need to purchase the domestic currency to pay for goods. A trade deficit can weaken the currency over time, although other factors often dominate in the short term.

Commodity Prices and Resource-Dependent Economies

For countries that export significant amounts of oil, gold, or other commodities, currency values are closely tied to commodity prices. The Canadian dollar, Australian dollar, and Norwegian krone are examples of commodity currencies. Rising commodity prices generally support these currencies, while falling prices can weigh on them.
