- **Libera me** (Soprano and Chorus): The final movement recalls music

from the opening, creating a cyclical structure. The soprano soloist delivers a fervent plea for deliverance, and the chorus responds with increasing intensity. The work ends not with a triumphant resolution but with a whispered plea for eternal rest.

Studying these movements with the **Imslp Verdi Requiem** score allows musicians to appreciate the architectural genius of the work, from the large-scale dramatic arcs to the smallest details of phrasing and articulation.
