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## **MATERIALS AND TOOLS YOU'LL NEED**

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Before you begin, gather the following items. Having everything ready makes the process smoother and prevents interruptions.

# Essential Materials

- **550 Paracord** – Usually 6 to 8 feet (1.8-2.4 meters) will produce a standard-sized keychain. Choose a color that suits your style. Mil-

spec paracord is recommended for its strength and durability.

- **Key Ring** – A 1-inch (25 mm) metal split ring is ideal. You can use a larger ring if you prefer a looser weave.
- **Scissors or a sharp knife** – For cutting the cord cleanly.
- **Lighter or heat source** – To melt and seal the ends of the paracord, preventing fraying.
- **Measuring tape or ruler** – Optional, but helpful for consistent lengths.

## Optional Accessories

- **Beads or charms** – Slide onto the cord before tying for extra flair.
- **Small carabiner** – Instead of a key ring, you can use a mini carabiner for easy attachment.
- **Metal or plastic fid** – Helps with adjusting tight knots.
- **Glue** – A drop of super glue can secure the final knot if desired.

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### UNDERSTANDING THE NINJA KEYCHAIN DESIGN

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The ninja keychain is

essentially a woven sheath that covers a loop of cord attached to a key ring. The weaving pattern is a flat, tight cobra stitch that creates a flexible but rigid structure. Unlike a round braid, the flat weave lies nicely against keys or in a pocket. The “ninja” aspect comes from the fact that the free ends are tucked inside after weaving, giving a clean, hidden finish. When you pull the loop, the entire keychain unravels into a long piece of paracord.

Before starting, note that the number of passes (weaving rows) determines the final length. A standard keychain uses about 8 to 10 passes on each side. The instructions below assume you want a medium-sized

keychain (roughly 3–4 inches long). Adjust the number of passes if you want it longer or shorter.

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## **STEP-BY-STEP PARACORD NINJA KEYCHAIN INSTRUCTIONS**

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Follow these steps carefully. The process involves creating a loop around the key ring and then weaving the two ends around the loop to form the cobra pattern.

# Step 1: Prepare the Cord and Key

## Ring

1. Cut a length of paracord. For a typical keychain, 7 feet (2.1 meters) is a safe starting point.
2. Melt both ends with a lighter to prevent fraying. Let them cool for a few seconds.
3. Thread one end of the cord through the key ring. Pull it so that about 6 inches (15 cm) of cord extends on one side (this will be the working end) and the rest (the long tail) on the other.

## Step 2:

## Form the Base Loop

1. Hold the key ring with your left hand (if right-handed). Bring the long tail up and over the ring to create a loop. The loop should be about the desired length of your keychain.
2. Cross the working end (the shorter piece) over the long tail, forming an "X" just below the ring.
3. Now take the working end behind the long tail and bring it up through the loop you created.

This is essentially a lark's head knot variant, but we are setting up the weave.

4. Tighten the knot so that the loop is snug against the ring. You now have two parallel strands coming down from the ring: the long tail (left) and the working end (right).

## Step 3: Start the Cobra Weave

1. Take the left strand (long tail) and cross it over the right strand. This is the first

half of the stitch.

2. Then take the right strand and pass it behind the left strand, then up through the loop formed by the left strand. Pull tight. You have just completed one stitch.
3. Now reverse: take the right strand and cross it over the left strand, then pass the left strand behind the right and up through the loop. Pull tight.
4. Continue alternating left-over-right, then right-over-left. After a few stitches, you will notice the weave tightening and forming a flat rectangular

pattern.

## Step 4: Weave to Desired Length

1. Keep weaving until the covered section reaches about 2.5 to 3 inches (6–7.5 cm) from the ring. For a longer keychain, weave more rows.
2. Periodically push the stitches upward toward the ring to keep them tight and even.
3. Stop when you have a comfortable length. Remember that

you will add a finishing knot.

## Step 5: Finish the Weave

1. On the last stitch, do not pull the working end all the way through. Leave a small loop for tucking.
2. Cut the working end and the long tail, leaving about 1/2 inch (1.25 cm) of each.
3. Melt the cut ends with a lighter and quickly press them into the weave or tuck them inside the last stitch. This hides the ends and secures the

weave.

4. If you prefer a cleaner finish, you can use a needle to thread the ends through the weave and then trim and melt.

ring.

2. Test that the weave is secure and does not slip. If it slides too easily, you may need to tighten the stitches more.
3. To reset, simply re-weave the cord back into the pattern. With practice, this becomes quick and intuitive.

## Step 6: Check the Keychain Function

1. Gently pull the loop that extends from the bottom of the weave. The entire keychain should start to unravel, revealing a single long cord attached to the

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## Keep Consistent Tension

Uneven tension can make the weave look lumpy or cause it to

unravel unevenly. Pull each stitch with the same force. Using a fid or the tip of a pen can help tighten hard-to-reach spots.

## Choose the Right Cord Length

If you cut too much cord, you will have long tails to hide. Too little, and you cannot finish the weave. As a rule of thumb, each inch of weave consumes about 12 inches of cord. For a 3-inch keychain, start with about 6 feet (72 inches) to be safe, plus extra for the loop and tucking.

## Add a Bead or Charm

Before you begin weaving, slide a bead onto the long tail. After forming the first knot, push the bead up against the ring. Then weave around it. This adds a unique touch and can serve as a fidget element.

## Use a Jig for Consistency

If you plan to make multiple keychains, consider using a simple board with two pegs to

hold the loop. This keeps the weave uniform and hands-free.

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## COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO FIX THEM

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- **Weave too loose:** The keychain will lack rigidity and may come apart. Tighten each stitch by pulling both ends outward after each pass.
- **Weave too tight:** The keychain becomes stiff and difficult to unravel. Loosen your tension slightly and use a fid to adjust.
- **Uneven sides:** This happens when you forget to alternate the starting side.

Count your stitches: each pair (left-right) counts as one row. If one side has more rows, the weave will curve.

- **Ends visible:** Always melt and tuck the ends thoroughly. Press them into the weave while the plastic is still hot but not burning. Use a damp cloth to cool if needed.

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## VARIATIONS OF THE NINJA KEYCHAIN

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# Two-Color Cobra

Use two different colored cords. Cut two lengths of 3.5 feet each. Tie them

together with a temporary knot, then attach the midpoint to the key ring. Weave as usual, with one color on each side. This creates a striking striped pattern.

## King Cobra (Double Weave)

After completing the standard weave, take a second, slightly longer cord and weave it over the first layer. This creates a thicker, more durable keychain that offers extra cord length.

## Integrate

## d Fire Starter

Insert a small ferro rod into the center of the loop before weaving. The rod will be encased in the weave, and you can add a small scraper tab. This turns your keychain into an emergency fire-starting tool.

## Monkey Fist Keychain

While not a true ninja keychain, a monkey fist knot around a marble or bearing can serve a similar purpose. Combine it with a cobra weave handle for a hybrid design.

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## **WHY LEARN PARACORD KEYCHAIN INSTRUCTIONS?**

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Knowing how to weave a paracord keychain is a practical skill that blends creativity with survival preparedness. The finished product can be used as a zipper pull, a lanyard, or a small rope in a pinch.
