6. **Add the Legs:** Draw four slender cylinders extending from the torso. The front legs should be relatively straight, while the back legs have a noticeable bend at the knee. Keep the hooves rounded and simple.
7. **Draw the Mane and Tail:** Starting from the top of the head, sketch curved lines that flow backward. Add overlapping sections to create volume. For the tail, draw lines that sweep from the base of the spine. Do not worry about perfection at this stage, focus on flow.
8. **Refine and Erase:** Once the basic structure is in place, go over your lines with a darker pencil. Erase the original guidelines and any overlapping construction lines.
9. **Add Details:** Draw the nostrils (two small dots or curved lines), a small smile, and the ears (two pointed triangles on top of the head). Finally, add the cutie mark on the flank, if desired.
10. **Practice Variations:** Repeat the process but change the mane style, the eye expression, or the leg position. This repetition is where your skills truly solidify.

COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

Eyes That Are Too High or Too Far Apart

Legs That Are Too Thick or Too Thin

Pony legs are slender but not stick-like. They should have a gentle taper from the upper body to the hoof. A good rule of thumb is to keep the legs proportional to the head width. If the head is wide, the legs should be slightly thicker. Compare your drawing to the book's examples frequently to calibrate your proportions.
