## Autofocus and Shooting Speed

The Nikon D3500 uses an 11-point autofocus (AF) system with a single cross-type sensor in the center. Let’s be honest: this is not the fastest or most sophisticated AF system available in 2025. It is a basic phase-detection system that works well in good light but can struggle in low contrast situations or with fast-moving subjects. For a beginner photographing static landscapes, portraits, or slow-moving family members, it is perfectly adequate.

However, for action sports or wildlife photography, you will quickly notice its limitations.

The continuous shooting speed is 5 frames per second (fps). This is respectable for an entry-level DSLR. It allows you to capture a sequence of a child blowing out birthday candles or a dog running across a field. The buffer depth is reasonable, allowing around 30 JPEGs or 7 RAW files before the camera slows down.
