HOW TO USE THE OVERSTREET COMIC BOOK PRICE GUIDE EFFECTIVELY

For the uninitiated, flipping through Overstreet can be a dense experience. The guide is organized alphabetically by publisher (DC, Marvel, etc.) and then numerically by issue number. Here is how to get the most out of it:

- Identify Your Comics Accurately:** Before you can price a comic, you must know exactly what it is. Check the indicia (the small text block usually on the first page) for the publisher, volume number, and exact issue number. Price variants, such as "Canadian Editions" or "Newsstand vs. Direct Editions," can have drastically different values.
- Master the Grading Scale:** This is the most critical step. Do not simply guess the condition of your comic. Lay it on a clean, flat surface under a good light source. Use the guide's

detailed grading definitions to find the correct grade. A book graded at "Fine" (6.0) will be worth a fraction of the same book graded at "Near Mint" (9.4). Being honest and accurate with grading is the key to using the guide correctly.

- Understand the Prices:** The prices listed in Overstreet are not fixed street prices. They are **Guide Values** representing the price a book should sell for between a knowledgeable buyer and a knowledgeable seller in a fair, unpressured transaction. They are a benchmark. In reality, a dealer at a convention may charge a premium (especially for high-grade copies of popular keys), while a collector might find a bargain at an estate sale. The guide gives you the starting point for negotiation, not the final word.
- Check for "Key" Issues:** The guide clearly marks important issues, such as first appearances, first covers, and origin stories. These "keys" are the powerhouse of the market. A common issue from the 1980s might be worth \$2 in Overstreet, but a key first appearance from the same era could be worth hundreds or thousands. The guide helps you identify these needle-in-a-haystack issues.
