From Newsprin t to Nautical: A Brief History

The act of folding paper into hats is an ancient one, with roots in origami and traditional folk crafts. However, the specific association with pirates is a product of popular culture, heavily influenced by classic literature and Hollywood films like *Treasure Island* and

Peter Pan. While real pirates of the Golden Age wore a variety of headwear, from bandanas to tricorne hats, the iconic "pirate captain" look—with the wide, turned-up brim—became solidified in the public imagination. The newspaper version likely emerged as a cheap and easy way for children to emulate their swashbuckling heroes. Because newspaper was ubiquitous and easily folded, it became the perfect medium for this playful transformation. Today, making a **pirate hat made out of newspaper** is a rite of passage, connecting generations through a simple, shared act of creation.

MATERIALS AND

PREPARATION

Before you begin your journey to becoming a fearsome pirate captain, you will need to gather your materials. The beauty of this project is its minimal requirements.

- **One Full Sheet of Newspaper:**

A standard broadsheet or tabloid page works perfectly. A double-page spread is ideal, as it provides a larger, more manageable piece of paper. Avoid using glossy magazine pages or thin newsprint that might tear easily.

- **A Flat Surface:**

A table, desk, or clean floor will provide a good workspace.

- **Tape or Glue (Optional but Recommended)**

: While you can make the hat hold its shape with folds alone, a small piece of tape or a dab of glue will make it much more durable, especially for active play.

- **Decorations (Optional):**

Markers, crayons, paint, feathers, stickers, or even a paper skull and crossbones can be used to personalize your hat.

Once you have these items ready, you are all set to begin. The process is straightforward and can be mastered in just a few tries.

STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE: HOW TO MAKE A PIRATE HAT MADE OUT OF NEWSPAPER

Follow these clear instructions to create your own **pirate hat made out of newspaper**. The folding process creates the classic tricorne or bicorne shape commonly associated with pirate captains.

Step 1: Prepare the Paper

Lay your full sheet of newspaper flat on your work surface. If you are using a double-page spread, you may want to fold it in half along the center crease to create a single, thick

sheet. This will give your hat more structure. The paper should be oriented in landscape format, with the longer sides on the top and bottom.

Step 2: Fold in Half Horizonta lly

Take the top edge of the paper and fold it down to meet the bottom edge. Crease the fold firmly. You should now have a rectangle that is half the height of the original sheet. The open edges will be at the bottom, and the folded edge will be at the top.

Step 3: Fold Down the Top Corners

Now, take the top-left corner of the folded rectangle and fold it down towards the center line of the paper. The edge of the fold should create a triangle. Repeat this with the top-right corner, bringing it down to meet the first fold. The two folds should meet in the middle of the paper, forming a point at the top. Your paper should now look like a house shape, with a triangle on top and a rectangle below.

Step 4: Fold Up the Bottom Flaps

You will notice that there is a strip of paper at the bottom of your "house" shape that is not part of the triangle. This strip is composed of two layers (front and back). Take the top layer of this bottom strip and fold it upwards, over the bottom edge of the triangle. Crease this fold well. Then, flip the entire paper over and repeat this step with the other layer of the bottom strip, folding it upwards as well. You now have a simple

paper hat shape, often called a "newspaper hat."

Step 5: Create the Classic Pirate Brim

This is the crucial step that turns a simple hat into a **pirate hat made out of newspaper**. The current hat is likely a pointed "sailor's" hat. To make it a pirate hat, you need to create the wide, turned-up brim. Open the bottom of the hat slightly. Take the front edge of the brim (the part that was just

folded up) and fold it upwards again, this time by about two inches. Crease it sharply. This creates the first part of the turned-up brim. Flip the hat over and repeat this step on the back brim, folding it upwards by the same amount. This symmetrical fold is what gives the hat its distinctive tricorne look.

Step 6: Shape and Secure

Open the hat fully and place it on your head. The brim should now be turned up all around, creating the classic pirate captain

profile. You can pinch the top of the hat to give it a more pointed or rounded shape, depending on your preference. If the brim is not holding its shape well, use a small piece of tape on the inside of each side to secure the folds. A little tape goes a long way in ensuring your **pirate hat made out of newspaper** stays intact during your adventures.

CUSTOMIZING YOUR NEWSPAPER PIRATE HAT

Now that you have the basic shape, it is time to make it your own. A plain newspaper hat is impressive, but a decorated one is a true work of art. Here are some ideas to elevate your **pirate hat made out of newspaper** from simple to spectacular.

Painting and Coloring

Newspaper can be surprisingly receptive to color. You can use watercolors, tempera paint, or even strong markers to give your hat a custom look. For a classic feel, paint the entire hat black or dark brown. For a more weathered look, try using a combination of grey and brown paints to simulate old, salt-stained fabric. Let the paint dry completely before wearing the hat.

Adding Pirate

Embellish ments

The hallmark of any pirate hat is the emblem. A classic **skull and crossbones** (also known as a Jolly Roger) is a must. You can draw one directly on the front of the hat with a white marker or paint. Alternatively, you can cut one out of white paper and glue it on. Other great embellishments include:

- **Feathers:** Tuck a large feather (real or craft) into the band of the hat for a dashing, romantic pirate look.
- **Gold Trim:** Use gold or yellow paint or a strip of

gold foil to create a decorative band around the base of the hat.

- **Jewels:** Glue on some plastic "gems" or sequins for a bit of treasure-hunter flair.
- **Patch and Eye:** Create a matching eye patch from a piece of black paper and string to complete the ensemble.

Distressing g for Authentic ity

A true pirate has seen some battles. You can give your **pirate hat made out of**

newspaper a weathered look by carefully tearing or fraying the edges of the brim. You can also crumple the paper slightly before you start folding to give it a more textured, worn appearance. Be careful not to tear the paper too much, as it could compromise the hat's structure.

The Tricorne Variation

While the standard newspaper hat has a pointed top, you can modify the folds to create a more historically accurate tricorne shape. After completing Step 5, instead of folding the brim straight up, you can fold the front brim up, then fold the sides of the brim inward, creating a three-cornered shape. This is a bit more advanced but yields a hat that looks straight out of an 18th-century painting.

Variation

For a different historical flavor, you can create a bicorne hat. This is the hat famously worn by Napoleon Bonaparte. To make this variation, after folding the basic hat, instead of folding the brim up all around, you fold the front and back brims *down* and the side brims *up*. This creates a distinctive sideways-facing hat with a pointed front and back. While not strictly a pirate hat, it shows the versatility of the basic newspaper folding technique.

G COMMON ISSUES

Even with clear instructions, you might run into a few snags when making your **pirate hat made out of newspaper**. Here are some common problems and how to fix them.

- **The hat is too small or too big:** Newspaper sizes vary. If your hat is too small, start with a larger sheet (two full pages taped together). If it is too big, use a smaller sheet or fold the brim up a bit more.
- **The brim keeps flopping down:** This is usually a sign that your folds are not sharp enough. Use a ruler or

your finger to press down very firmly on the creases. If it still flops, use tape on the inside of the brim to hold it in place.

- **The paper tears during folding:** Newspaper is delicate. Be gentle with your folds. If the paper starts to tear, use a small piece of clear tape to repair the tear. Using a thicker layer of newspaper (like a double-page spread) can also prevent tearing.
- **The hat does not stay on your head:** The newspaper hat is not designed to be a tight-fitting hat. It will sit

loosely on your head. If you need it to stay on more securely, you can attach a piece of elastic string to either side of the brim and wear it under your chin.

BEYOND THE HAT: OTHER

NEWSPAPER PIRATE CRAFTS

Once you master the **pirate hat made out of newspaper**, you can expand your pirate crafting to include other accessories. A folded newspaper sword or cutlass is a natural companion to the hat. You can also make a simple
