combination of two Surges and follows a set of Ideals that guide their actions. The Skybreakers, bonded with highspren, wield the Surges of Gravitation and Division, making them formidable warriors and judges. However, their true identity lies not merely in their powers but in their unwavering commitment to an external code of law, which has led them down paths that challenge conventional notions of heroism.

The Origins and

History of the Skybreak ers

The Skybreakers trace their origins to the Herald Nalan, also known as Nale, the Herald of Justice. Unlike other Heralds who abandoned their duties after countless Desolations, Nale remained active on Roshar, continuing to administer his personal brand of justice for millennia. His influence directly shaped the Skybreaker Order, instilling in them a devotion to law above all else. During the era of the Silver Kingdoms, the Skybreakers served as judges,

executioners, and enforcers of legal codes across the land. When the Recreance occurred—the mass abandonment of the Oaths by the Knights Radiant—the Skybreakers were among those who broke their bonds. However, uniquely, the Order did not entirely vanish. Nale himself continued to seek out and train new Skybreakers in secret, preserving their traditions and knowledge. This unbroken lineage distinguishes the Skybreakers from Orders like the Windrunners, who had to rediscover their abilities from scattered fragments of history. The **Skybreaker Stormlight** tradition remained alive, waiting for the return of the

Voidbringers.

This continuity of knowledge allowed the Skybreakers to maintain a structured hierarchy and a clear understanding of their powers. While other Orders struggled to rebuild, the Skybreakers already possessed a functioning organization with established protocols and a chain of command. This advantage made them uniquely prepared for the events unfolding in the modern era of the Stormlight Archive.

The Ideals of the

Skybreakers

Every Knight Radiant swears a series of Ideals that represent their personal growth and commitment to their Order. For the Skybreakers, these Ideals revolve around law, justice, and the subjugation of personal will to a greater code. Unlike the Windrunners, who follow an internal moral compass to protect the innocent, Skybreakers look outward to established law for their guidance.

- **The First Ideal:** "Life before death, strength before weakness, journey before destination." This is the universal

Ideal shared by all Orders of Knights Radiant.

- **The Second Ideal:** "I will put the law above all else." This foundational Ideal establishes the Skybreaker's primary commitment. The law becomes their master, and personal feelings or biases must not interfere with its execution.
- **The Third Ideal:** "I will serve those who enforce the law." At this stage, the Skybreaker dedicates themselves to supporting legitimate authority, whether a ruler, a government, or a legal body.

- **The Fourth Ideal:** "I will seek justice for all, regardless of their station." This Ideal broadens the Skybreaker's perspective, requiring them to ensure fairness even for those who cannot defend themselves.
- **The Fifth Ideal:** "I will become the law." The highest and most challenging Ideal, the Fifth Ideal allows the Skybreaker to transcend written law and become an embodiment of justice itself. Only Nale has achieved this Ideal in known history.

The progression of these Ideals reveals the Skybreaker philosophy: starting with adherence to external law, moving through service to authority, then seeking universal justice, and finally becoming a living embodiment of law. This path demands immense discipline and self-abnegation. The **Skybreaker Stormlight** powers grow stronger with each Ideal, granting greater control over Gravitation and Division.

The Surges of the

Skybreakers

Each Order of Knights Radiant is defined by two Surges—fundamental forces of nature that they manipulate through Stormlight. The Skybreakers control Gravitation and Division, a combination that makes them both highly mobile and devastatingly destructive.

GRAVITATION: THE SURGE OF GRAVITY AND PRESSURE

Gravitation allows Skybreakers to alter the direction and intensity of gravitational pull on themselves and objects. This Surge provides remarkable

mobility, enabling them to fly, fall upward, or increase their weight for combat advantage. In the context of the **Skybreaker Stormlight** powers, Gravitation is often used in subtle ways, such as increasing downward force to pin an opponent or reducing gravity to leap incredible distances.

Skybreakers train extensively in the Lashings, the specific techniques for applying Gravitation. A Basic Lashing changes the direction of gravity for the user, allowing flight. A Full Lashing bonds objects together with the force of a powerful adhesive. An Auxiliary Lashing alters gravity for a target other than the user, potentially hurling

enemies into the sky or pinning them to the ground. Mastery of these techniques requires precise Control, as poorly directed Lashings can cause unintended collateral damage.

DIVISION: THE SURGE OF DESTRUCTION AND DECAY

Division is one of the most fearsome Surges in the Cosmere. It allows the Skybreaker to break bonds between particles, causing materials to decay, crumble, or even explode into nothingness. A Skybreaker can touch a stone wall and cause it to disintegrate, or sever the structural integrity of an enemy's armor. Division acts not by brute force but

by undoing the connections that hold matter together.

This Surge requires immense responsibility, as its misuse can lead to catastrophic destruction. The Skybreaker philosophy of law and order directly informs how they use Division. They are trained to apply this power judiciously, only when the law demands it. A Skybreaker does not simply destroy; they execute a sentence. The **Skybreaker Stormlight** abilities thus become instruments of legal authority, delivering the final judgment pronounced by the law.

Notable Skybreakers in the Stormlight t Archive

The history and events of the Stormlight Archive feature several prominent Skybreakers whose actions illustrate the Order's philosophy and influence.

NALE, THE HERALD OF JUSTICE

Nale is the most powerful and enigmatic Skybreaker. As a Herald, he possesses abilities far beyond those of ordinary Radiants, including near-immortality and access to the Surges of

the Skybreakers and the Dustbringers. For millennia, he has wandered Roshar, dispensing justice according to the legal codes of the land. However, his Law is rigid and absolute, often lacking mercy or nuance. Nale's actions in the modern era, particularly his decision to side with the Voidbringers, have made him a controversial figure. He believes that by following the law of the land—which recognizes the Voidbringers' claim—he remains true to his Ideals, even if it means opposing other Radiants. Nale's journey represents the central tension of the Skybreaker Ideal: can law exist without morality, and can justice be served by a code that does not

adapt?

SZETH-SON- NETURO, THE ASSASSIN IN WHITE

Szeth's journey from the weapon of others to a Skybreaker of the Third Ideal is one of the most transformative arcs in the series. Originally a truthless Shin man forced to obey anyone who held his Oathstone, Szeth committed terrible acts against his will. After being freed, he sought Nale to learn the Skybreaker way. Szeth's tragedy lies in his deep desire for external law to guide him, as he fears his own judgment after being used as a tool for so long. He craves the certainty that the Skybreaker Ideals provide. By swearing to put the law above all

else, Szeth hopes to find redemption and purpose. His bond with the highspren Nin and his training in the **Skybreaker Stormlight** techniques offer him structure in a chaotic world. Szeth's narrative highlights the appeal of the Skybreaker path for those who have suffered from a lack of agency.

OTHER SKYBREAKERS IN THE ORDER

Beyond Nale and Szeth, the Skybreaker Order includes numerous members who serve as judges, prosecutors, and executioners throughout Roshar. They maintain hidden strongholds and keepers of legal knowledge. During the

events of the Stormlight Archive, the Skybreakers emerge as a unified force under Nale's leadership, offering a stark contrast to the fractured and rebuilding Windrunners. Their organization and discipline make them a formidable faction, even if their moral alignment remains ambiguous.

The Skybreaker er Philosophy: Law

versus Justice

The central philosophical question posed by the Skybreakers is whether law and justice are the same thing. Throughout the Stormlight Archive, Skybreakers consistently choose law, even when the law leads to unjust outcomes. This tension is not presented as a flaw but as a deliberate exploration of moral philosophy. The Skybreakers believe that without a fixed code, justice becomes arbitrary and subject to personal bias. For them, the law provides a stable foundation for society, even if it is imperfect.

Critics of the

Skybreakers point out that laws can be written by tyrants or corrupt regimes. The **Skybreaker Stormlight** Ideals, however, do not require the law to be just—only that it be followed. This absolutism creates conflicts with other Radiants, particularly Windrunners, who follow their conscience. The tension between these two approaches—external law versus internal morality—drives much of the ideological conflict in the Stormlight Archive.

It is worth noting that the Fifth Ideal, "I will become the law," offers a potential resolution. By becoming the law himself, a Skybreaker transcends written codes and embodies

the ideal of justice. However, this requires perfect wisdom and moral clarity, which few possess. Nale's pursuit of this Ideal reveals its dangers: a being who considers himself above the law may become a tyrant, justifying any action as just. The Fifth Ideal thus represents both the highest aspiration and the greatest risk of the Skybreaker path.

Skybreakers versus Other Radiant

Orders

Understanding the Skybreakers requires comparing them to other Orders of Knights Radiant. Below is a brief overview of their key contrasts.

- **Windrunners:**

Windrunners follow an internal moral code focused on protecting the innocent. They rely on their conscience to determine right from wrong. Skybreakers reject this subjectivity, insisting on external law as the arbiter of justice.

- **Lightweavers:**

Lightweavers confront their own truths and

embrace self-discovery. Their journey is internal and psychological. Skybreakers focus externally on societal structures and legal systems.

- **Edgedancers:**

Edgedancers remember the forgotten and help those overlooked by society. Skybreakers serve the law, which may ignore the needs of the marginalized. The two Orders often conflict in their priorities.

- **Dustbringers:**

Both Skybreakers and Dustbringers share a Surge—Division—but

Dustbringers focus on self-mastery and controlled destruction. Skybreakers use Division as a tool of legal enforcement.

These contrasts highlight the diversity of the Knights Radiant. Each Order offers a different path to the same First Ideal, but their interpretations of that Ideal vary dramatically. The **Skybreaker Stormlight** philosophy stands as the most rigid and legalistic among them, providing

a necessary counterbalance to the more flexible Orders.

The Role of Skybreakers in the Modern Era
