A plea bargain is an agreement between the prosecutor and the defense where the defendant pleads guilty to a lesser charge in exchange for a more lenient sentence or the dismissal of other charges.

## Trial and Sentencing

If a "not guilty" plea is entered, the case proceeds to trial. The trial is the most formal and public part of the process. Both sides present evidence, call witnesses, and make arguments. The prosecution must prove guilt "beyond a reasonable doubt"—the highest standard of proof in our legal system. If the jury (or judge in a bench trial) returns a verdict of "guilty," the case moves to the sentencing phase. At sentencing, the judge considers a range of factors, including the severity of the crime, the defendant's criminal history, and victim impact statements, before imposing a sentence. This sentence activates the corrections pillar.
