UNDERSTANDING RECORDER FINGERING BASICS

The soprano recorder, which is the most common type used in schools and for beginners, is typically played with the left hand covering the top three holes and the right hand covering the lower four holes. COMPLETE AMAZING GRACE LETTER NOTES ON RECORDER

Here are the **Amazing Grace letter notes for recorder**, broken down phrase by phrase. The notes are written using the standard letter naming system (A, B, C, D, E, F, G). On a standard soprano recorder, an apostrophe (') after a note indicates that it is a higher octave note. For example, D' is a high D. Practice each

Playing the Full Verse

To play the first verse in its entirety, you will follow the traditional structure. The melody repeats with slight variations. Here is a more detailed breakdown of the notes corresponding to the lyrics "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound, That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost, but now am found, Was blind, but now I see."

1. **"Amazing grace, how sweet the sound":** B B A G B D' D' (hold the last D')
2. **"That saved a wretch like me":** E' D' B A G (hold the final G)
3. **"I once was lost, but now am found":** B B A G B D' D' (hold the last D')
4. **"Was blind, but now I see":** E' D' B A G (hold the final G)

This pattern covers the first half of the verse. The second half, which repeats the "I once was lost" phrase, continues with the same notes but often includes a slight embellishment or a longer held note at the end. Practicing these **recorder notes for Amazing Grace** in small sections will make learning the entire song much more manageable.

STEP-BY-STEP TUTORIAL FOR AMAZING GRACE ON RECORDER

Step 1: Mastering the Individual Notes

Begin by isolating each note you will need. Play a long, steady B. Then move to A, then G. Pay attention to the feeling of each finger placement. Next, practice the transition from G to B, which requires lifting your thumb and first finger. Then practice jumping up to high D' and E'. These are the trickiest transitions. Practice going from G to D' and back again until the movement feels smooth and automatic. This foundational work is the most important part of learning the **Amazing Grace recorder fingering chart** in practice.

Step 2: Playing the First

Phrase Slowly

Take the first phrase, "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound" (B B A G B D' D'). Play it at a glacial pace. Count out loud: ONE (B) two three, ONE (B) two three, ONE (A) two three, ONE (G) two three, ONE (B) two three, ONE (D') two three, ONE (D') two three. Do not worry about speed. Your goal is clarity. Each note should speak clearly without squeaks or warbles. Repeat this phrase ten times before moving on.

Step 3: Adding the Second Phrase

Now, add the second phrase: "That saved a wretch like me" (E' D' B A G). Again, play it extremely slowly. Focus on the transition from high D' down to B, which requires coordinating your right-hand fingers. Once you can play the first two phrases separately without mistakes, try connecting them. Play "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound" and immediately continue into "That saved a wretch like me." Breathe at the comma, not in the middle of a word.

Step 4: Completing the Verse

Follow the same process for the third and fourth phrases. The third phrase is nearly identical to the first: "I once was lost, but now am found" (B B A G B D' D'). The fourth phrase is identical to the second: "Was blind, but now I see" (E' D' B A G). Once you have practiced all four phrases individually and in pairs, try playing the entire verse from beginning to end. Celebrate this milestone. You have just played the first verse of a classic hymn.

TIPS FOR IMPROVING YOUR AMAZING GRACE PERFORMANCE

Breath Control and Dynamics

"Amazing Grace" is a song that benefits greatly from dynamic contrast. Do not play every note at the same volume. Think about the shape of each phrase. For the opening "Amazing grace," begin softly and grow slightly louder on "grace," then taper off on "sound." This creates a natural, singing quality. Use your diaphragm to support your breath. Take a deep, silent breath before you begin playing. This will help you sustain the long notes, like the final G in each phrase, without running out of air. Good breath control is what separates a mechanical recitation of **recorder notes for beginners** from a musical performance.

Articulation: Making Each Note Speak

Use your tongue to articulate each note cleanly. Gently say "doodle" or "diddle" with your tongue as you blow. This technique, known as double tonguing for faster passages, but for this slow hymn, simply using a soft "doo" for each note (or for groups of notes) will add clarity. For "Amazing Grace," try using a

soft "d" for the first note of each measure, and then let the subsequent notes in the measure flow more legato (smoothly connected). This will give your playing a gentle, lilt.

Adding Grace Notes and Embellishments

Once you are comfortable with the basic melody, you can add very simple embellishments to make your performance more interesting. A grace note is a very quick, ornamental note played just before a main note. For example, before the final high D' in the first phrase, you could quickly play a C' then immediately land on the D'. This is an advanced technique, but it adds a beautiful, traditional flavor to the hymn. Start by listening to recordings of "Amazing Grace" played on the recorder or other wind instruments to hear how professionals use these ornaments.

COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID WHEN LEARNING AMAZING GRACE

Many beginners struggle with the transition from the low notes to the high notes. The jump from G to D' or B to D' often results in a squeak. This almost always happens because the thumb hole at the back of the recorder is not opened correctly. For high notes, the thumb must be rolled to a precise position, leaving a small crack. Practice this thumb movement separately. Another common mistake is rushing. The beauty of this hymn lies in its slow, steady pace. Use a metronome if you have one, or simply count deliberately. Finally, do not neglect the low notes. The G and A at the bottom of the melody require warm, gentle air. Blowing too hard will make them sound harsh. Treat every note with care, from the highest E' to the lowest G.

FREE PRINTABLE RECORDER NOTES FOR AMAZING GRACE

Having a visual reference is incredibly helpful when you are learning. While this article provides the complete letter notes, you may wish to write them out on a piece of paper and tape them to your music stand. Create a simple chart that shows the lyrics with the corresponding **recorder notes for the song Amazing Grace** written above each syllable. For example:

EXPLORING VARIATIONS: DIFFERENT WAYS TO PLAY AMAZING GRACE
