(Note: The actual logic is that lansones fruit hangs with the stem on top, like the smoke going up – but the riddle is meant to be tricky.)

Logic Puzzles in Tagalog

- **Paliwanag:** This classic puzzle uses the heat from the bulb as a clue, requiring forward thinking.
- **Palaisipan:** Si Juan ay may 10 pirasong manok. Lahat maliban sa siyam ay namatay. Ilan ang natitira?
Sagot: Siyam. (Nine.)
Paliwanag: The phrase “lahat maliban sa siyam” means all except nine died, meaning nine are still alive. Word plays with numbers.

Wordplay and Homonym Teasers

Tagalog is full of words that sound the same but have different meanings. These teasers are great tests of language mastery.

1. **Teaser:** Ano ang tawag sa aso na tumatahol sa gabi?
Sagot: Aso (dog) – pero may dalawang kahulugan? Actually, it’s a trick: “aso” means dog, but also can refer to a “night dog” – the answer is simply dog. The twist is that it expects you to overthink.
2. **Teaser:** May isang salita na mababasa mo kahit baliktad. Anong salita ito?
