THE MAJOR OLYMPIAN GODS AND GODDESSES

B – Boreas to Briareos

- **Boreas** – God of the north wind and winter. He was one of the four wind gods (Anemoi).
- **Briareos** – One of the Hecatoncheires, hundred-handed giants who helped Zeus in the Titanomachy.

C – Calypso to Cronus

- **Calypso** – A nymph and minor goddess who detained Odysseus on her island. She was associated with concealment.
- **Circe** – A powerful sorceress and minor goddess of magic, known for transforming her enemies into animals.
- **Cronus** – Leader of the Titans, father of Zeus, and god of time. He ruled before the Olympians and was overthrown by his son.

D – Demeter to Dionysus

- **Demeter** – Goddess of agriculture, harvest, fertility, and sacred law. Her grief over Persephone's abduction caused seasons.
- **Dionysus** – God of wine, festivity, madness, and ecstasy. He was the youngest Olympian and represented the primal,

untamed forces of nature.

E – Eileithyia to Eris

- **Eileithyia** – Goddess of childbirth and labor pains. She was invoked by women during delivery.
- **Eos** – Titan goddess of the dawn. Each morning she rose from the ocean to announce the sun.
- **Eris** – Goddess of strife, discord, and rivalry. Her golden apple sparked the Trojan War.

F – No major gods begin with F in the standard Greek pantheon, but some minor figures like **Phobos** (personification of fear) are often included.

G – Gaia to Gorgons

- **Gaia** – Primordial goddess of the Earth. She was the mother of the Titans, Cyclopes, and other ancient beings.
- **Gorgons** – Three monstrous sisters (Medusa, Stheno, Euryale) with snakes for hair. Medusa was mortal.

H – Hades to Hypnos

- **Hades** – God of the underworld, the dead, and riches. He was not considered evil but stern and impartial.
- **Hecate** – Goddess of magic, crossroads, ghosts, and witchcraft. She was a chthonic deity and a guide in darkness.
- **Helios** – Titan god of the sun who drove his chariot across the sky each day.
- **Hephaestus** – God of fire, metalworking, sculpture, and craftsmanship. He was the divine blacksmith.
- **Hera** – Queen of the gods, goddess of marriage, women, and family. She was Zeus's wife and often vengeful towards his lovers.
- **Heracles** – A divine hero and demigod, later deified. He was known for his incredible strength and twelve labors.
- **Hermes** – Messenger god, patron of travelers, thieves, merchants, and orators. He also guided souls to the underworld.
- **Hestia** – Goddess of the hearth, home, and domestic life.

She was one of the original Olympians but gave her seat to Dionysus.

- **Hypnos** – God of sleep. He lived in a cave where the river Lethe flowed, and he could put gods and mortals to sleep.

I – Iris to Iapetus

- **Iris** – Goddess of the rainbow and messenger of the gods. She served Hera and linked the mortal world to Olympus.
- **Iapetus** – Titan god of mortality and craftsmanship. He was the father of Prometheus, Epimetheus, and Atlas.

J – No Greek deities start with J; the Latinized name for Zeus is Jupiter, but that is Roman.

K – Kratos to Kronos (see

Cronus)

- **Kratos** – Personification of strength and power, a son of the Titan Pallas and Styx. He was a servant of Zeus.

L – Leto to Lyssa

- **Leto** – Titan goddess of motherhood, modesty, and unseen light. She was the mother of Artemis and Apollo.
- **Lyssa** – Goddess of mad rage and frenzy. She personified the uncontrollable fury that could seize humans and animals.

M – Maia to Mnemosyne

- **Maia** – One of the Pleiades, a nymph and mother of Hermes by Zeus. She was associated with growth and nurture.
- **Melpomene** – Muse of tragedy. She was one of the nine Muses, daughters of Zeus and Mnemosyne.
- **Mnemosyne** – Titan goddess of memory and the mother of the Muses. She gave names to all things.

N – Nemesis to Nyx

- **Nemesis** – Goddess of retribution and divine justice. She punished hubris and arrogance.
- **Nike** – Goddess of victory. She was often depicted with wings and accompanied Zeus and Athena.
- **Notus** – God of the south wind, associated with summer storms and heat.
- **Nyx** – Primordial goddess of the night. She was so powerful that even Zeus feared her.

O – Oceanus to Ouranos

- **Oceanus** – Titan god of the great river Oceanus that encircled the Earth. He was the father of the Oceanids and river gods.
- **Ouranos** – Primordial god of the sky. He was the father of the Titans and was overthrown by Cronus.

P – Pan to Poseidon

- **Pan** – God of the wild, shepherds, flocks, and rustic music. He was half-man, half-goat.
- **Persephone** – Goddess of spring vegetation and queen of the underworld. She was the daughter of Demeter and Zeus.
- **PHEME** – Goddess of rumor, fame, and gossip. She was a

messenger who spread news both true and false.

- **Prometheus** – Titan god of forethought and trickery. He created humans and stole fire from Olympus for them, earning Zeus's wrath.
- **Poseidon** – God of the sea, earthquakes, storms, and horses. He was one of the three major sons of Cronus.

Q – No major Greek gods begin with Q. Quirinus is Roman.

R – Rhea to Rhadamanthus

- **Rhea** – Titan goddess of fertility, motherhood, and the mountains. She was the wife of Cronus and mother of the Olympians.
- **Rhadamanthus** – A wise judge of the dead in the underworld, son of Zeus and Europa.

S – Selene to Styx

- **Selene** – Titan goddess of the moon. She drove a silver chariot across the night sky.
- **Styx** – Oceanid goddess of the river Styx, the boundary

between Earth and the underworld. Oaths sworn by her were unbreakable.

T – Tartarus to Tyche

- **Tartarus** – Primordial god of the abyss and the deepest pit of the underworld. He was also a prison for the Titans.
- **Thanatos** – God of non-violent death. He was the twin brother of Hypnos.
- **Tyche** – Goddess of fortune, luck, and prosperity. She was often depicted with a cornucopia and a ship's wheel.

U – Uranus (see Ouranos)

V – No Greek gods start with V; Victoria is Roman (Nike).

W – No major Greek gods

start with W. However, the wind gods (Anemoi) are sometimes mentioned.

X – Xenios (Zeus as protector of strangers) is an epithet.

Y – No Greek gods start with Y.

Z – Zephyrus to Zeus

- **Zephyrus** – God of the west wind, associated with gentle breezes and spring.
- **Zeus** – King of the gods, ruler of Mount Olympus, god of the sky, lightning, thunder, law, order, and justice. He was the supreme deity.

LESSER-KNOWN GODS AND SPIRITS
