Simply reading a Kaiser typing test sample is not enough. You need to practice typing it repeatedly under realistic conditions. Set a timer for five minutes and type the passage as accurately as possible. When time expires, compare your typed version to the original. Count your total words typed and subtract five words for every error to calculate your net WPM. This gives you a more accurate picture of your effective typing

speed.

Focus first on accuracy. If you find yourself making frequent mistakes, slow down until your accuracy reaches 97% or higher. Speed will naturally increase as your muscle memory improves.
