In *Final Destination*, he plays Billy Hitchcock, the quiet, slightly awkward friend who provides essential comic relief amid the tension. Billy is the everyman of the group – he just wants to live his life, but he’s caught up in a terrifying supernatural pattern.

His cryptic lines about death’s plan and the idea that only new life can break the pattern are among the film’s most quoted moments. Todd’s presence adds instant gravitas and a connection to classic horror cinema.

These supporting actors each contribute to the rich tapestry of the **Final Destination 1 cast**, ensuring that every scene is populated by credible, compelling performers.

THE DIRECTOR AND VISION BEHIND THE CAST
